

Instructions for Outpatient Termination of Pregnancy

Women's Services Patient Information

You have been given mifepristone in clinic today, for the termination of your pregnancy, which is the first part of the medical treatment. After taking this medication we do not expect you to have any side effects and you can continue your normal activities as planned.

Whilst in clinic you will also have been given misoprostol tablets to use at home to complete the termination which should lead to bleeding and passing the pregnancy.

Step 1: You should take the misoprostol tablets betweenand
on
• There are four tablets to take orally as part of step one.
• Put two of the misoprostol tablets under your tongue and let them dissolve.

• Once the first two tablets have dissolved put the remaining two tablets under your tongue and let them dissolve.

What will happen after I have taken the misoprostol tablets.

- You may experience sickness, diarrhoea, a fever and shivering as a result of this medication.
- You will start to cramp and bleed approximately 1 to 4 hours after taking the misoprostol tablets. Most patients will have heavy bleeding and pass the pregnancy within 24 – 48 hours. You should have someone with you to assist you if your symptoms are severe. Some women may have lighter bleeding for several days, then pass clots and the pregnancy. Do not use tampons
- You may eat and drink as normal after you have taken the misoprostol tablets
- It is normal for a termination to cause pain. To help with the pain take the pain killers you have been provided with. You can also take ibuprofen, which you can buy over the counter.

What about sex?

- We advise you to avoid sexual intercourse until you have stopped bleeding.
- Please be aware that you are at risk of becoming pregnant again following the termination so it is vital that you start to use some form of contraception as soon as you become sexually active.

What to do if the bleeding is very heavy?

- If your bleeding is very heavy (changing more than 1 pad/hour) or you require any advice please phone the Women's Health Unit on 01274 383341 Monday to Friday 08:00 –15:00 or alternatively call Gynaecology Assessment and Treatment Unit (GATU)for urgent advice on 01274 383225 (24 hour contact).
- It is important to do a pregnancy test to ensure that the termination process is complete
- Please do a follow up pregnancy test on ______
- It normally takes three weeks for your pregnancy test to go to negative.

What should you do if the pregnancy test is still positive?

If the test is positive this **does not** mean that you are still pregnant. Please call the Women's Health Unit on 01274 383341 for further advice. If your call goes through to the answerphone please leave a message and we will return your call as soon as possible.
